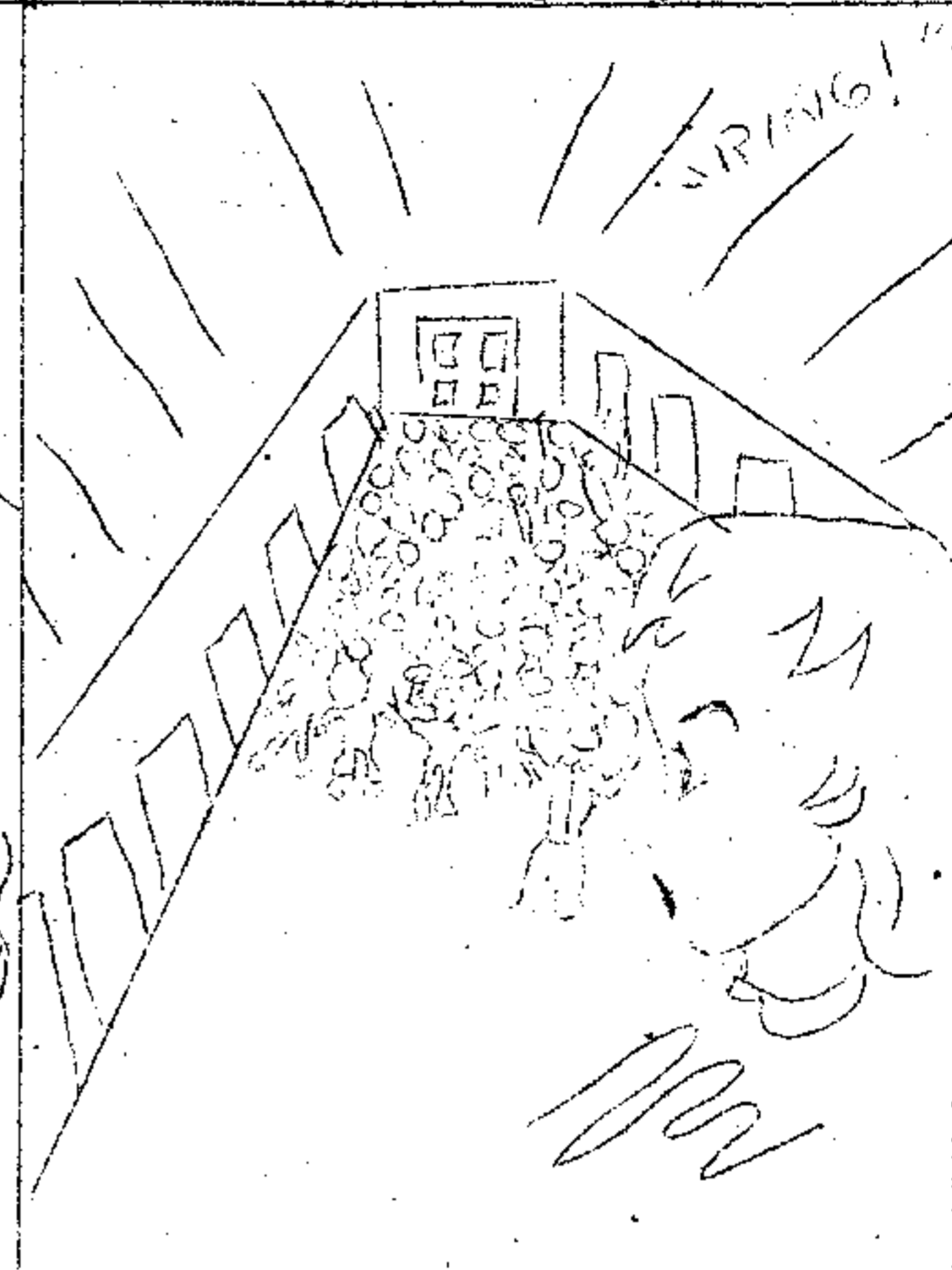
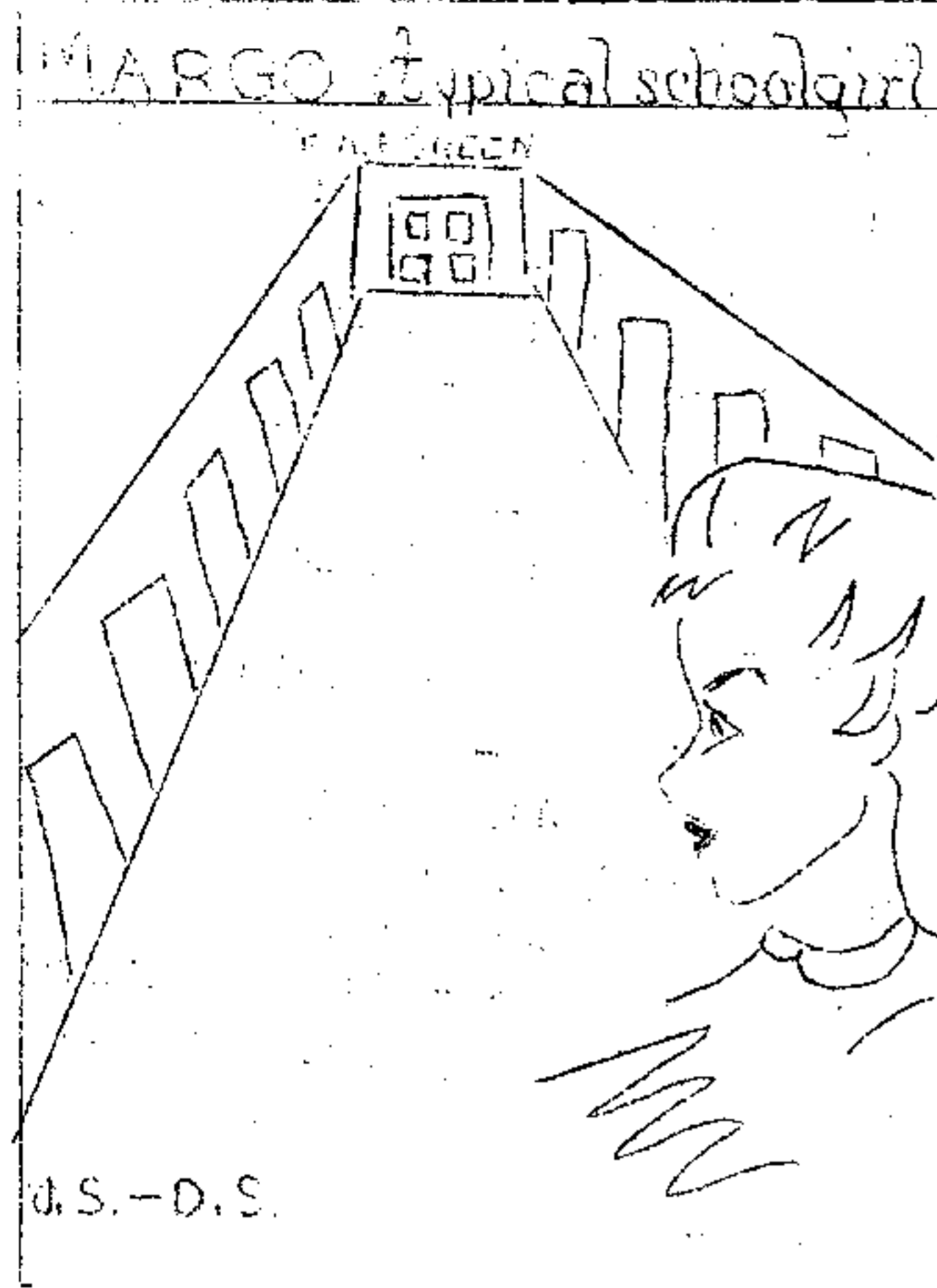
The constitution of the Boy's Club was discussed by the Cabinet. Committee Chairmen were chosen for standing committees of the Boy's Club, they were:
